Designers and general contractors re-

quire skills and tools to do their job effectively. Yet, all too often, interview teams are sent to represent their firm with a just PowerPoint and a stomach full of nerves. Many project managers, estimators and superintendents haven't been given the tools or skills to effectively manage this job requirement with the confidence and authority they handle the rest of their work.

Presenting is a skill. And the good news is that this is a skill that can be developed. Improving the effectiveness of your presenters and your presentations will pay off hugely, especially in this market.

There are many things you can do today that can improve your short-list to win ratio. Here are a few tips to make your interview presentations more effective:

1. Make it easy for the panel to give you points. The panel can't give you points for questions they don't know you answered. And if they are taking notes, they miss something. So help them out.

- Identify which question you are answering and restate it before providing your response. Example: In question one you asked us to introduce our firm, the team we have.

- If you are using boards or PowerPoint, identify which question that slide or board is in response to.

2. Remember it's not about you: What's in it for the owner? The panel doesn't want to know why you are so great. They want to know what you can do for them. Help each owner understand how your firm and your experience will be uniquely valuable to them on this project.

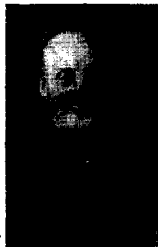
